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*As Unesco and most of the other organizations of the United Nations system are celebrating their fiftieth anniversary, and despite the progress made by humanity in the past few decades, the world situation remains critical in several respects: intolerance, injustice, and inequality. This is an opportunity to ponder the meaning and the future of the ideals and principles underpinning Unesco's action by going back to the fountainhead of the Organization: its Constitution. In the light of emerging global trends it makes it possible to see the implications of ideas and concepts such as peace, the democratic ideal, respect for the human person in dignity and equality, the intellectual and moral solidarity of humanity, the ideal of equal education opportunity for all, the free exchange of ideas and knowledge shared prosperity and the advancement and*

dissemination of knowledge. The concept of a commutative generalized neutrosophic ideal in a BCK-algebra is proposed, and related properties are proved. Hogan's *The Tragedy of the Athenian Ideal in Thucydides and Plato* assesses the roles of Pericles, Alcibiades, and Nicias in Athens' defeat in Thucydides' Peloponnesian War. Comparing Thucydides' presentation of political leadership with ideas in Plato's *Statesman* as well as *Laches*, *Charmides*, *Meno*, *Symposium*, *Republic*, *Phaedo*, *Sophist*, and *Laws*, it concludes that Plato and Thucydides reveal Pericles as lacking the political discipline (*sophrosune*) to plan a successful war against Sparta. Hogan argues that in his presentation of the collapse in the Corcyraean revolution of moral standards in political discourse, Thucydides shows how revolution destroys the morality implied in basic personal and political language. This reveals a general collapse in underlying prudential measurements needed for sound moral judgment. Furthermore, Hogan argues that the *Statesman's* outline of the political leader serves as a paradigm for understanding the weaknesses of Pericles, Alcibiades, and Nicias in terms that parallel Thucydides' direct and implied conclusions, which in Pericles' case he highlights with dramatic irony. Hogan shows that Pericles failed both to develop a sufficiently robust practice of Athenian democratic rule and to set up a viable system for succession. This book provides a comprehensive exposition of  $M$ -ideal theory, a branch of geometric functional analysis which deals with certain subspaces of Banach spaces arising naturally in many contexts. Starting from the basic definitions the authors discuss a number of examples of  $M$ -ideals (e.g. the closed two-sided ideals of  $C^*$ -algebras) and develop their general theory. Besides, applications to problems from a variety of areas including approximation theory, harmonic analysis,  $C^*$ -algebra theory and Banach space geometry are presented. The book is mainly intended as a reference volume for researchers working in one of these fields, but it also addresses students at the graduate or postgraduate level. Each of its six chapters is accompanied by a *Notes-and-Remarks* section which explores further ramifications of the subject and gives detailed references to the literature. An extensive bibliography is included. Renie S. Choy uncovers the relationship between the intercessory function of monasteries and the ascetic concern for moral conversion in the minds of prominent religious leaders active between c. 750-820. Through sustained analysis of the devotional thought of Benedict of Aniane and contemporaneous religious reformers during the reigns of Charlemagne and Louis the Pious, Choy examines key topics in the study of Carolingian monasticism: liturgical organization and the intercessory performances of the Mass and the Divine Office, monastic theology, and relationships of prayer within monastic communities and with the world outside. Arguing that monastic leaders showed new interest on the intersection between the interiority of prayer and the functional world of social relationships, this study reveals the ascetic ideal undergirding the provision of intercessory prayer by monasteries. This early work by William Morris was originally published in 1899 and we are now republishing it with a brand new introductory biography. William Morris was born in London, England in 1834. Arguably best known as a textile designer, he founded a design partnership which deeply influenced the decoration of churches and homes during the early 20th century. John Nolen's *New Ideals in the Planning of Cities, Towns, and Villages* is the most thorough assessment of city planning written by an American practitioner before 1920. It records the interplay of urban reform in Europe and the United States, the rise of the planning expert, the design of new towns, and the technique for directing urban expansion on systematic lines. Most important, it documents the blueprint for investing the "peace dividend" of the Great War to make urban life "more fit for democracy". Written for men fighting to make the world safe for democracy, *New Ideals* revealed how the domestic part of the peace program could justify their sacrifice. The wartime housing initiative had improved the living conditions of industrial workers and the same public regulation and control of the layout and character of residential neighbourhoods could provide what "men of service expect to find on their return, a new and better type of workman's home." While *New Ideals* strained towards the utopian, experience tempered Nolen's expectations and the high aims of the book were not immediately realised in a post-war society seeking a return to pre-war normalcy. However in the last decade, Nolen's planned communities have been closely studied as the demand for pedestrian-oriented neighbourhoods set on sustainable lines has moved from novelty to policy. *New Ideals* is an important text not only for its design template, but also its aspirations. Nolen's call to "make cities that will serve the needs--physical, economic, and spiritual-- of all people" lays at the heart of the city planning profession and the lessons Nolen imparted inform a new generation planning cities to be both resilient and just. Jun, Borumand Saeid and Ozturk studied neutrosophic subalgebras/ideals in BCK/BCI-algebras based on neutrosophic points (see [1], [6]and [10]). Examples of domains studied include (1) those with weak factorization, in which each nonzero, nondivisorial ideal can be factored as the product of its divisorial closure and a product of maximal ideals and (2) those with pseudo-Dedekind factorization, in which each nonzero, noninvertible ideal can be factored as the product of an invertible ideal with a product of pairwise comaximal prime ideals. Prüfer domains play a central role in our study, but many non-Prüfer examples are

considered as well. Besides giving an introduction to Commutative Algebra - the theory of commutative rings - this book is devoted to the study of projective modules and the minimal number of generators of modules and ideals. The notion of a module over a ring  $R$  is a generalization of that of a vector space over a field  $k$ . The axioms are identical. But whereas every vector space possesses a basis, a module need not always have one. Modules possessing a basis are called free. So a finitely generated free  $R$ -module is of the form  $R^n$  for some  $n \in \mathbb{N}$ , equipped with the usual operations. A module is called projective, iff it is a direct summand of a free one. Especially a finitely generated  $R$ -module  $P$  is projective iff there is an  $R$ -module  $Q$  with  $P \oplus Q \cong R^n$  for some  $n$ . Remarkably enough there do exist nonfree projective modules. Even there are nonfree  $P$  such that  $P \oplus R^m \cong R^n$  for some  $m$  and  $n$ . Modules  $P$  having the latter property are called stably free. On the other hand there are many rings, all of whose projective modules are free, e. g. local rings and principal ideal domains. (A commutative ring is called local iff it has exactly one maximal ideal. ) For two decades it was a challenging problem whether every projective module over the polynomial ring  $k[X_1, \dots]$ .

Modern hygienic urbanism originated in the airy boulevards, public parks, and sewer system that transformed the Parisian cityscape in the mid-nineteenth century. Yet these well-known developments in public health built on a previous moment of anxiety about the hygiene of modern city dwellers. Amid fears of national decline that accompanied the collapse of the Napoleonic Empire, efforts to modernize Paris between 1800 and 1850 focused not on grand and comprehensive structural reforms, but rather on improving the bodily and mental fitness of the individual citizen. These forgotten efforts to renew and reform the physical and moral health of the urban subject found expression in the built environment of the city—in the gymnasiums, swimming pools, and green spaces of private and public institutions, from the pedagogical to the recreational. *Sun-Young Park* reveals how these anxieties about health and social order, which manifested in emerging ideals of the body, created a uniquely spatial and urban experience of modernity in the postrevolutionary capital, one profoundly impacted by hygiene, mobility, productivity, leisure, spectacle, and technology. In his provocative new book, *The Tyranny of the Ideal*, Gerald Gaus lays out a vision for how we should theorize about justice in a diverse society. Gaus shows how free and equal people, faced with intractable struggles and irreconcilable conflicts, might share a common moral life shaped by a just framework. He argues that if we are to take diversity seriously and if moral inquiry is sincere about shaping the world, then the pursuit of idealized and perfect theories of justice—essentially, the entire production of theories of justice that has dominated political philosophy for the past forty years—needs to change. Drawing on recent work in social science and philosophy, Gaus points to an important paradox: only those in a heterogeneous society—with its various religious, moral, and political perspectives—have a reasonable hope of understanding what an ideally just society would be like. However, due to its very nature, this world could never be collectively devoted to any single ideal. Gaus defends the moral constitution of this pluralistic, open society, where the very clash and disagreement of ideals spurs all to better understand what their personal ideals of justice happen to be. Presenting an original framework for how we should think about morality, *The Tyranny of the Ideal* rigorously analyzes a theory of ideal justice more suitable for contemporary times. The present volume comprises thirteen of the papers delivered at RICAN 5, which was held in Rethymnon, Crete, on May 25-26, 2009. The theme of the volume, 'The Construction of the Real and the Ideal in the Ancient Novel,' allows the contributors the freedom to use their skills to examine the real and the ideal either individually or in conjunction or in interaction. The papers offer a wide and rich range of perspectives: a political reading of prose fiction in Late Period Egypt (Selden); the presence of robbers and murderers in ideal fiction (Dowden); the interaction between illusion and reality in novelistic ekphrasis (Zeitlin); divine loves as real precedents for human loves (Rosati); comical elements in Heliodorus' *Aethiopika* (Doody); myths as paradigms for the inexperienced lovers in the Greek novels (Letoublon); moral ideas in the *Odyssey* and the Greek novels in relation to moralizing interpretations of Homer (Montiglio); the reality of the basic plot of *Callirhoe* in the light of historical events and Aristotle's *Poetics* (Paschalis); the interaction between fictionality and reality in *Daphnis and Chloe* (Bowie); entrapment and insufficient understanding of reality in the *Satyricon* (Labate); fantasy, physical and ideal landscapes in Apuleius' *Metamorphoses* (Konig); bridging the gap between *Phaedra* (real) and *Isis* (ideal) in Apuleius (Carver); the gendered aesthetics of the Greek novels viewed through the lens of the mimetic theory of Dionysius of Halicarnassus (Whitmarsh).
