6 Sonatas and Partitas Jun 25 2020 It is one of Josef Joachim's great merits, not only to have introduced the following sonatas of Johann Sebastian Bach into the Concert-Hall, but also to have made them loved by the great public. They were almost unknown before Joachim played them with his grand art of interpretation, and brought out all the beauties of this magnificent music. Some parts of these sonatas had been played in public by certain violinists before Joachim's time, but as the spirit and the technique of these works were quite strange to the performers, the interpretation made a ridiculous impression on the audience. When I completed my studies at the Berliner Hochschule under Joachim's direction, the study of these sonatas formed one of the most important parts of his teaching. Joachim used

the very excellent edition by Ferdinand David, based on Bach's manuscript, to be found in the Royal Library in Berlin. All the same Joachim changed a great deal in this edition, with regard to the manner of playing, bowing, fingering and marks of interpretation, and I kept to all the alterations made by him. I very often had the opportunity of hearing Joachim play these works at concerts as well as during his classes, and so I was able to observe the fineness of his interpretation down to the smallest detail. As I am publishing the standard works of violin literature in connection with my own teaching, it was a special pleasure to me to revise these Sonatas – which I consider one of the most important works written for the violin – in such a manner, that no doubt may be left as to the best and easiest way of mastering the great and unusual difficulties which they contain. I hope to show by this to all young violin-artists, to whom the study of the following sonatas cannot be too strongly recommended – a sure way to a really perfect and beautiful rendering of the same.

An Adaptable Approach to Expertise Aug 20 2022 Ivan Galamian was a violin pedagogue whose methods were celebrated for their seemingly universal success. A key component of his pedagogy was a set of adaptable variations intended for the development of

correlation, or the mind's ability to control to movements of the body. These variations could be applied to scales, arpeggios and excerpts from music to provide a virtually endless collection of challenging material. This dissertation first explores the efficacy of this component of Galamian's pedagogical method through the lens of perceptual-motor skill acquisition and the study of expertise. By following the technical practice guidelines set forth in *Principles of Violin Playing and Teaching* by Galamian, a performer can develop a vast bank of implicit and explicit memories, or mental representations, that can be drawn on later. The continual progression of exercises also helps minimize or avoid the plateau in development associated with automaticity, and instead expands the physical and cognitive elements of playing which will eventually, through deliberate practice, lead to expert performance. Second, I consult with former Galamian students and published interviews to find out how his technical ideas were implemented in lessons and how they fit into the context of the other material being taught such as sound development and musical interpretation. Galamian's lessons were logical and methodical, and he communicated his ideas through a great deal of playing and very little talking. Lastly, I explain several

ways in which I have incorporated Galamian's technical variation ideas into my own practicing and teaching. While certain aspects of trumpet pedagogy benefit from repetitive, habitual action, other areas like technical development can benefit from Galamian's adaptable approach. By applying variability to create new challenges from existing trumpet methods, the usefulness and efficacy of these existing books can be expanded and extended indefinitely.

ViolinMind Mar 23 2020 ViolinMind is a pedagogical method book that focuses on intonation. It is a transcription for the violin of CelloMind published in 2017 by Ovation Press, Ltd. The co-authors of ViolinMind are Hans Jørgen Jensen, Professor of Cello at the Bienen School of Music at Northwestern University and Grigory Kalinovsky, Professor of Music (Violin) at Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. The mystery of intonation is dissected by defining

Chapters in the book explore in great detail topics such as the harmonic overtone series, the scientific principles behind Cents, the syntonic comma, the just scales, the Pythagorean comma, the Pythagorean semitones, advanced sympathetic vibrations, Tartini tones, and double stops studies in tritones. All chapters in the book include numerous practical samples and listening exercises that bridge the gap between the theory and its application. The chapters on intonation conclude with practical examples from the following repertoire: intonation performance practice in the Bach Sonatas and Partitas for Violin Solo (BWV 1001-1006), and intonation performance practice with piano. The appendices in the book provide detailed explanations about the Helmholtz intonation chart, the harmonic

series, just intonation, the Schisma, as well as an illustration of two violin fingerboards from two method books from the 18th century showing pitch distribution for just intonation and Pythagorean intonation respectively.

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
